Accomplishments

City response: No changes.

City Response: The Title VI Program is administered, on behalf of the Mayor, by the Public Works Department. The Public Works Department leads coordination with other city departments, as needed, for Title VI program implementation. Due to recent staffing changes, including a vacancy in the position of City Engineer, The Public Works Director is presently designated as the Title VI Coordinator and is responsible for the administration and implementation of the Title VI program. When needed, support for the Title VI Coordinator's responsibilities is provided by either the City Engineer or the Public Works Business Manager (who also acts as the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Coordinator for the City of Mount Vernon).

A Public Works Department Title VI Program Organizational Chart is attached as Attachment A. The Senior Project Engineer position indicated on the organizational chart has been vacant for a few years, but is retained for a future hiring decision.

During the next reporting year, the Public Works Department will review its assignment of roles and responsibilities for the Title VI program and, in particular, determine whether the role of Title VI Coordinator will remain with the Public Works Director or be assigned to the City Engineer.

The City Council of the City of Mount Vernon consists of seven elected representatives, elected to four-year terms, by the voters in the City. City Councilmembers typically represent the diversity present in the community. Six of the seven City Councilmembers are elected by voters resident in geographical subareas of the city, called wards. A map of the City of Mount Vernon wards is included within Appendix B.

The City Council establishes policy directions for the City (including transportation program priorities); enacts ordinances and resolutions; maintains relationships and accountability between the city government and the general public, as well as other local, state, regional and federal entities; and generally provides leadership for the City.

City Response: This report utilizes 2022 American Community Survey (ACS) Demographic and Housing Estimates prepared by the U.S. Census Bureau, and adjusted for growth (approximately 0.96% per annum) based off estimates from the Washington State Office of Financial Management.

The City of Mount Vernon continues to have a diverse population of ethnic groups and income levels.

As showing in the table below, the primary non-English language prevalent in Mount Vernon is Spanish. When considered by language, Spanish speakers make up a substantial majority of the city's Limited English Proficiency (LEP) population. Consequently, public events and outreach communications, such as the public participation meetings outlined below, prioritize the availability of Spanish language translators and/or online translation services to support public participation, input, and feedback.

The City receives the majority of their written translation services through Language Exchange, 716 E Fairhaven Ave, Burlington, WA 98233; the City also uses Language Line Services. In 2021 the City contracted with Language Exchange to provide translation services at public meetings and events 39 times (see attached 2021 invoice summary). The City's website also utilizes Google Translate which translates the entire website into a wide number of languages including Spanish.

Annual costs tend to vary, though translation expenses incurred by the transportation program during the 2024 reporting period were negligible due to the pause in transportation project delivery, as discussed below.

Data provided by Washington State Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) reports show a 54% Hispanic population in City of Mount Vernon public schools, with up to 24% enrolled in transitional bilingual programs.

OSPI also reports approximately 62% of students in City of Mount Vernon public schools qualify for the free or reduced-price meal program.

City Response: No Title VI public complaints were received during the 2024 reporting period.

City Response: Due to changes in City staff and finalization of a delivery schedule for the 2026 Comprehensive Plan Update by the Development Services Department, transportation planning activities during the 2024 reporting period in the City of Mount Vernon were curtailed. The City adopted a 2025-2030 Transportation Improvement Program mostly identical to the 2024-2029 Transportation Improvement Program reported in the 2023 Title

VI annual report of Accomplishments and Goals.

Many of these paused transportation planning activities either have restarted in early 2025 or are expected to restart later during the 2025 reporting period. Transportation planning activities during the 2025 reporting period will include:

- Transportation Element – 2026 Comprehensive Plan Update
- 2026-2031 Transportation Improvement Program Update
- Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Transition Plan Update for Public Right-of-Way Facilities
- 2025 update to the Citywide Pavement Preservation Program

Maps correlating projects on the adopted 2025-2030 Transportation Improvement Program with population demographics are included as Attachment B.

City Response: No right-of-way activities listed above were performed during the 2024 reporting period.

City Response: No right-of-way appraisers and/or acquisition staff were used during the 2024 reporting period.

City Response: No transportation studies or plans were completed during the 2024 reporting period.

9. Project Location and Design: Provide a list of construction projects that began during this reporting period. City Response: Due to staffing changes in the Public Works Department during the 2024 reporting period, transportation construction projects were reduced over previous years. Many design projects were either paused, postponed, or cancelled as well.

Construction projects began or continuing during the 2024 reporting period:

- **2024 Street Improvements (Street Pavement Overlay):** This project completed a mill and thin overlay of the existing street surfaces in the following areas of Mount Vernon:
 - Martin Road (Trumpeter Blvd to College Way)
 - 15th Street (Division St to Kincaid St)
 - Kincaid Street (1st St to 3rd St)
 - 2nd Street (Kincaid St to Broadway)
 - 3rd Street (Kincaid St to Broadway)

A primary benefit of a continuing, annual pavement preservation program project, such as a mill and thin overlay, prolongs the life of an existing asphalt pavement surface and reduces the demand on future City transportation funding for more costly street pavement rehabilitation and/or replacement. Another benefit is the completion of needed pedestrian ADA accessibility improvements, such as crosswalk ramps, in the same areas as a pavement overlay project. Finally, the last three street segments focused on the location of the new Mount Vernon Library Commons building, improving both the pavement and pedestrian ADA accessibility for approaches to the new library.

- **2024 Curb Ramp Improvements:** This construction project completed needed ADA pedestrian improvements, particularly for intersection crosswalks, in conjunction with the street segments listed above for the 2024 Street Improvements Project.

A primary benefit of a continuing, annual ADA improvements construction project is to enhance both safety and accessibility for pedestrian use of the public rights-of-way. This is particularly important for public street users who either cannot or prefer not to use a motor vehicle.

- **Mount Vernon Library Commons:** Although not explicitly a transportation construction project, this project included the construction of a new, multi-level parking garage to substantially increase the available parking in downtown Mount Vernon and in close proximity to key destinations such as the Skagit County Courthouse, the Skagit Transit regional station, and the Amtrak train station. In addition to motor vehicle parking, this project's garage also provides electric vehicle charging and bicycle storage.

This project combines the benefits of key enhancements to multiple modes of transportation with a popular community destination in the form of a new, enlarged public library. The Mount Vernon library program sponsors a wide variety of community activities, in addition to library services, many of which are valuable for Mount Vernon residents with limited English proficiency.

Construction projects during the 2024 reporting period did not adversely impact areas of the city with minority and/or protected populations.

10. Other Public Meetings: List other public meetings held during this reporting period. Identify efforts used to encourage citizen participation at those meetings. Detail dates, times, locations, attendance, and provide examples of outreach materials.

City Response: The City did not hold any transportation-specific public meetings outside of City Council regular meetings, during the 2024 reporting period.

The City has developed and maintained remote attendance options for online participation in all of Mount Vernon open public meetings related to City business. Open public meetings include those of the City Council (regular sessions twice monthly), Planning Commission, Library Board, Arts Commission, Civil Service Commission, public hearings, and others. Remote options allow for both attendance and participation using Internet or telephone means.

Availability of information to the public to assist and support in participating in public meetings include:

- Agendas, notices, and minutes of all meetings are available via the City of Mount Vernon's website.
- Council meetings are streamed live via the TV 10 Channel the City's YouTube channel. Members of the public who do not have cable or Internet access may listen to the meeting via telephone.
- Members of the public can sign up to speak at meetings. Accommodations are made available for people with disabilities and people with limited English proficiency who need translation services.

All City of Mount Vernon transportation construction contracts, consultant agreements, and right-of-way acquisitions and similar official acts relating to transportation projects are presented at City Council meetings open to the public both in-person and remotely, as indicated previously.

Public notifications and outreach for transportation project open houses include the means to integrate language translation, with a particular focus on Spanish as discussed previously. Those means include:

- Social media presence, particularly if online translation services such as Google Translate are available
- Regional and Local Radio Broadcasts: Spanish/English PSA's (Public Service Announcements)

City Response: Advertisements for consultant and contractor opportunities in the City of Mount Vernon are publicly advertised on the City website, in the Skagit Valley Herald (the local newspaper), and the Daily Journal of Commerce. The City uses an e-Procurement Portal service for all advertisements, which allow the public to view what opportunities are available, as well as information on how project contracts and professional agreements were bid and/or awarded.

City Response: The following statement and guidance are provided on the Public Works Department website, in both English and Spanish:

“The City of Mount Vernon hereby gives public notice that it is the City’s policy to assure full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, and related statutes and regulations in all programs and activities. Title VI and related laws requires that no person shall, on the ground of race, color, sex or national origin be excluded from the participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any Federal Aid Highway program or other activity for which the City of Mount Vernon receives Federal financial assistance.

“Any person who believes they have been aggrieved by an unlawful discriminatory practice under Title VI has a right to file a formal complaint with the City of Mount Vernon. Any such complaint must be in writing and filed with the City of Mount Vernon Title VI coordinator (Public Works Director) within one hundred eighty (180) days following the date of alleged discriminatory occurrence. The Title VI Complaint Procedures and Form may be obtained from the link below or from the Title VI Coordinator at no cost to the complainant by emailing cphillips@mountvernonwa.gov or calling 360-336-6204.

“Español: Es la norma del Departamento de Obras Publicas de la Ciudad de Mount Vernon garantizar que ninguna persona sea excluida de participar, ni que se le niegue beneficios, o de cualquier manera sea discriminada bajo ninguno de sus programas y actividades

subvencionados federalmente, en base a su raza, color, origen nacional y sexo, tal como se establece en el Título VI del Acta de Derechos Civiles de 1964. Cualquier persona que crea que se ha violado su protección bajo el Título VI, puede presentar una queja ante la Oficina de Oportunidades Iguales (OEO) de WSDOT. We also include the Title VI language in all advertisements for construction contractor bids or consultant services:

“Title VI Statement

The City of Mount Vernon, in accordance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. §§ 2000d to 2000d-4) and the Regulations, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively ensure that any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, disadvantaged business enterprises will be afforded full and fair opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in consideration for an award.”

The City of Mount Vernon incorporates into construction contract documents all applicable Title VI-related and similar general special provisions provided by WSDOT and APWA, particularly if the project is funded with federal transportation funding. This includes all required DBE goals, requirements, and procedures. City project managers work with WSDOT Local Programs staff to ensure advertisement and contract documents meet applicable federal requirements for projects funded with federal transportation aid.

City Response: No Title VI related training occurred during the 2024 reporting period.



City Response: The City plans the following improvements to our Title VI program.


- During the next reporting year, the Public Works Department will review its assignment of roles and responsibilities for the Title VI program and, in particular, determine whether the role of Title VI Coordinator will remain with the Public Works Director or be assigned to the City Engineer.
- Explore additional options for further integrating translation services along with new City Engineer plans to enhance public outreach and information sharing for capital improvement projects.
- In conjunction with updating the strategic plans for both the Pavement Preservation Program and the ADA Transition Plan Update and using evaluations of the mapped areas of language distribution, identify and implement means to reach out to potentially underserved areas, particularly where LEP considerations might limit understanding of public works design and construction projects.
- Evaluate further improvements to the approachability and effectiveness of our Title VI public complaint process, as the lack of any complaints at all suggest there may be barriers to remove. Similarly, we do not see as many direct contacts to the Public Works Department receptionist from members of the LEP community as the demographics suggest, so we will also evaluate how accessible/approachable the guidance for contacting the department directly is, and make improvements as needed.


**DEMOGRAPHIC MAPS AND THE 2025-

MOUNT VERNON COUNCIL WARDS







Percent of adults who have limited English ability, 2017-2021








6-Year TIP Project Overlay Map



La División de Desechos Sólidos del Departamento de Obras Públicas (Public Works Department, Solid Waste Division), de la ciudad de Mount Vernon ofrece servicios de recolección/eliminación de basura a todos los clientes residenciales y comerciales dentro de los límites de la ciudad. En el caso del servicio de basura residencial, la ciudad proveerá un carrito de plástico gris con ruedas. Estos carritos están disponibles en tres medidas; 35, 65, y 95 galones dependiendo de la cantidad de desechos que produce por semana (solo se ofrece la opción de agregar 20 galones más con un descuento elegible para adultos mayores). Para iniciar o interrumpir los servicios de recolección de basura, para aumentar o disminuir el tamaño de su carrito, o para cualquier duda relacionada con la basura, llame al (360) 336-6218.

La ciudad de Mount Vernon también ofrece contenedores de basura temporales para su uso en proyectos que estén dentro de los límites de la ciudad. El tamaño de los contenedores de basura varía de 1 yd a 30 yd. Visite nuestro sitio web para obtener más detalles e información sobre las restricciones.
